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The Centre for Longitudinal Studies (CLS) is an Economic and Social Research Council (ESRC) resource centre based at the Institution of Education (IOE), University of London. It provides support and facilities for those using the three internationally-renowned birth cohort studies: the 1958 National Child Development Study, the 1970 British Cohort Study and the Millennium Cohort Study. CLS conducts research using the birth cohort study data, with a special interest in family life and parenting, family economics, youth life course transitions and basic skills.

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Introduction

1. This document outlines information available on the characteristics of the areas in which members of the National Child Development Study (NCDS) were living at the time of selected surveys and which might be used for the study of, for example, the links between area social and economic conditions and individual social, economic and health outcomes. Appendices provide more details of the available area information.
2. NCDS is one of three cohort studies that are the responsibility of the Centre for Longitudinal Studies, an ESRC Resource Centre (<http://www.cls.ioe.ac.uk>). The cohort studies follow groups of individuals who were born at one particular time, throughout their lives, and have involved multiple surveys, collecting information on, for example, education and employment, family and parenting, physical and mental health, and social attitudes. The focus of NCDS is on those living in Great Britain who were born in one week in 1958. To date, NCDS surveys have been undertaken at: birth and 7, 11, 16, 23, 33, 42, 46 and 50 years of age. A Biomedical Survey was undertaken at age 44-45 and other quantitative/qualitative sub-sample studies have been undertaken of those in particular circumstances/with specific health conditions.

Linked geographical data

3. Details of the addresses of members of the NCDS cohort were gathered during each of the follow-ups noted above and have been used to provide information on location – for further details see: [Geographical Data and the CLS Cohort Studies](#). This information on the whereabouts of each individual can also be used to link information from other sources on the characteristics of the local area. For NCDS, the only linked data on area characteristics currently available relates to the surveys undertaken in 1974 (cohort age=16-years) and 1981 (cohort age=23- years).
4. Following the completion of the main 1981 survey, additional data were obtained which summarise the characteristics of the area in which each cohort member was living, both at the time of the 1981 survey and at the time of the 1974 survey. The address of each member of the NCDS cohort who participated in the 1981 survey was postcoded, as well as the address at the time of the previous follow-up in 1974, (as reported during the 1981 survey). The postcodes were then used to access enumeration district, ward, constituency, local authority, and other information from the Small Area Statistics (SAS) data from the 1971 and 1981 Census held by CACI International (1971 and 1981 Census) and the ESRC Data Archive (1981 Census). The linked data comprise the following:

Area data based on the 1971 Census

This provides for each respondent, both at 16 (1974 address) and 23 (1981 address), the following:

- **Location codes** - postcode, OPCS enumeration district, OPCS Census district, ward, constituency, pre-1974 district, post-1974 district, pre-1974 county, post-1974 county, standard region. See above.

- **ACORN type at enumeration district level** - a classification of OPCS enumeration districts into 36 residential neighbourhood types. The classification is based on 40 census variables covering demographic structure, household composition, housing, socio-economic structure and residents' employment characteristics. These ACORN neighbourhood types can be classified into 11 ACORN groups. (Webber and Craig 1978, Webber 1979). See Appendix 1.
- **Constituency type** - a classification of the 623 constituencies using the same 40 census variables which are the basis of ACORN. The classification is, however, different. Each constituency is allocated to one of 30 groups which can in turn be combined into 6 larger groupings. (Webber, 1978). See Appendix 2.
- **Census ratios** - these 19 ratios of 1971 Census counts, taken from the Small Area Statistics, provide summary area data descriptive of different aspects of the socio-economic structure, employment characteristics and housing environment for each respondent. They are recorded for both 1971 Census enumeration district (the smallest unit for which census statistics are available with an average population of about 460); and pre-1974 local authority. See Appendix 3.

Area data based on the 1981 Census

This provides for each respondent, and for the 1981 address only:

- **Location codes** - postcode, ward, district, county, standard region. See above.
- **ACORN type at ward level** - a classification of residential neighbourhoods into 38 types based on 41 variables from the 1981 Census encompassing demographic, housing and employment characteristics. The 38 neighbourhood types can be aggregated to give 11 neighbourhood groups (CACI 1983). See Appendix 4.
- **Census counts** - 331 counts taken from the 1981 Census Small Area Statistics relating to demographic, socio-economic, employment and housing characteristics which permit the derivation of summary measures describing different aspects of the area in which the respondent lives. They are recorded at the ward level only. See Appendix 5

The 1971 ACORN classification is a classification of OPCS enumeration district into 37 residential neighbourhood types. The classification is based on 40 1971 Census variables covering demographic structure, household composition, housing, socio-economic structure and residents' employment characteristics.
